Welcome back to the new school year and a big warm welcome to all the new children, staff and parents who have recently joined us.

As always, the start of the new school year is quite an exciting time for everyone. Let us hope once again, that this year proves to be just as rewarding and enjoyable to everyone as the previous one. The school has many interesting and exciting things planned for this year and we will always try our best to ensure that you are given as much notice as possible about these events. Please understand however, that things do not always go according to plan and information for events etc. can come through the school mail system at the last minute. Communication between home and school, as always, is very important to us. Evidence shows that if there is good home/school communication, then the whole school community is able to work more effectively and efficiently. Please remember - if we are not aware of an issue then we cannot attempt to address it!

Class teachers are available in the playground after school every night and parents are also able to arrange alternative times to meet before and after school if more privacy is required. I will also be out and about after school whenever possible, so please feel free to approach me or just say hello! Mrs Titterington will also be available where possible in the playground each morning should you need her.

Brookfields Development Meeting Tuesday 10 September 6pm.

I was approached last week by a member of the community, Dave Jones, to see if the school could be used to gather people in the community that are concerned about the proposed development off Archer Street. I'm sure you are aware of the of the impact two houses behind the school has made and continues to make e.g large trucks, road between the school constantly being used and damaged as a consequence etc. The proposed Brookfields development is for **21 houses** with no other way in or out of the development other than using Mill Lane. We as a school are against it and have objected but the meeting tomorrow is to discuss if anything further can be done to stop it. Anyone is welcome tomorrow night and it is anticipated that the meeting will last approximately 45 mins.

Managing Nut and Other Allergy Policy

Please may we bring to your attention our Managing Nut and Other Allergy Policy which can be viewed on our website. As you may be aware, **ANAPHYLAXIS** is a severe allergic reaction at the extreme end of the allergic spectrum, affecting the entire body and can occur within minutes of exposure. The main causes are attributed to nuts, seeds and seafood.

The Anaphylaxis Campaign highlights a number of problems with saying that we are a 'Nut Free School' as follows:

- It would be impossible to provide an absolute guarantee that the School is nut free, given that pupils regularly bring in food from home and food items bought on the way to School
- There would be a risk that children with allergies might be led into a false sense of security
- The nut ban would be seen as a precedent for demands to ban other potentially 'risky' foods.

However, whilst we are not proposing that we are a 'Nut Free School' the Governors have made the decision to not allow nuts into school to help minimise airborne allergic reactions to nuts. Therefore, nuts such as peanuts, cashew nuts, monkey nuts, almonds, pistachio etc (nuts in their natural form) are not allowed in school and will be sensitively taken off children if they are seen and handed back to the parents at the end of the school day. Nuts that are contained within products are still permitted e.g cereal bars etc. We do have a new child in school that does have a severe peanut allergy and we would appreciate your support with this matter when you are preparing packed lunches and snacks etc.

Policy on Food

Please could we remind parents about our Policy on Food. Children from Year 1 - 6 are allowed to bring a snack for mid-morning break should they wish. However, we encourage that snacks are healthy (no chocolate or sugary foods). Children in Key Stage 1 also have daily access to the fruit trolley. Children are encouraged to bring their own water bottle to school so that they are able to keep hydrated throughout the day. Children in Reception and Nursery have access to fruit and water throughout the day. Please see the following extract taken from the Policy on Food.

'We will ensure that our school environment promotes healthy eating. We do not encourage sweets or chocolate to be used as rewards or treats. Pupils and parents are also encouraged not to send sweets or chocolate into school for snacks. Special celebrations (birthdays, Easter, etc.) and events during the school year will be celebrated with either non-edible alternatives or given to the children at the end of the day and encouraged to be eaten after their evening meal.

We will encourage children to drink plenty of water by encouraging them to bring their own water bottle to school which can be kept in the classroom and filled up with water from the drinking taps. If a water bottle is not available for the child we will provide them with a cup and regular opportunities to drink water throughout the day.

Children will be encouraged to bring healthier foods such as fruit or foods that are sugar free and lower in fat and salt to eat at break times if they wish to have a snack.'

We have also introduced milk at dinnertime for any children wishing to have a drink of milk each day. This is regardless of whether they are on a school dinner or not.

'SHINE' day 19 September

Next week we are holding a 'SHINE day' where we will be reflecting on our mission and ethos statement 'Show Respect, Honesty, Include others, Never give up and Excellence'. It will be a very busy day for the children as they will be completing various activities throughout the day and will be asked to consider how they can 'SHINE' during their everyday lives both at home and at school.

Achievement Assembly – change of day

To show how proud we are of our children, we will continue to hold an Achievement Assembly for them each week where possible. However, due to music tuition now being on a Monday we will have to change the day to a Wednesday. Please remember that we invite the parents of any child receiving a certificate to the event. We are aware that sometimes a parent cannot attend; in this case any family member would be welcomed. In order to inform you that you are invited we will send a text out on a Friday for the Achievement Assembly on the following Wednesday morning at 9.05am. We understand that this is short notice but unfortunately we are unable to do this any other way. The Midday Assistants will also be awarding the children a 'Playground Hero' throughout the week and the children will receive a certificate during the Achievement Assembly. Once again a text will be sent out to inform you if you are invited to the assembly.

Macmillan – Friday 27 September Non Uniform day

Cancer is the toughest fight most of us will ever face and as treatments improve more and more people are living with cancer in their daily lives. As we are aware a great deal of parents work and are unable to attend a coffee morning in school. Therefore, this year in order to still raise money and awareness we will be holding a non uniform day on Friday 27 September. The money we raise will help make sure no one has to face cancer alone, from the moment they are diagnosed, through treatment and beyond.

School Meals

Please be advised that if you wish to change your child's school meal preference, we require one week's notice to make the necessary amendments and to inform our catering team.

Children receive homework and spellings weekly. We also encourage parents to read with their child every night. The children have PE twice a week (this is sometimes part of the Forest School sessions) and will therefore need their kits on the days indicated. School Uniform
