CO-OPTED GOVERNOR VACANCY

We currently have co-opted governor vacancies on our Governing Body that we wish to fill. Please feel free to share this vacancy with others in the community, as this vacancy does not necessarily need to be filled by a parent, as it is a co-opted vacancy.

Being a school Governor is an extremely vital role but in return highly rewarding. Governors ensure the highest priority is given to the concerns and issues most important to our parents and children.

Governing Boards have a statutory responsibility for the management of schools which they achieve by:

- *deciding strategy, policy and future development plans;*
- setting, managing and monitoring the school's budget;
- *implementing a clear Health & Safety Policy;*
- setting targets for raising standards of educational achievement;
- monitoring progress for meeting these targets; and
- finding the right balance between supporting and challenging the performance of the Headteacher and therefore the performance of all staff and the school as a whole.

It stands to reason that the more effective our Governing Board is, the more likely the school will successfully meet its aims, objectives and statutory duties. The decision making is collective; no one governor has the right to make decisions or is left to 'go it alone'.

Please don't be put off by thinking that you need to have specialist knowledge or experience of the educational system. Enthusiasm, interest and a keen desire to learn and attend training is much more important to start with. The training and support available from the Local Authority and our Governor Induction Programme will help you throughout your four years' term of office. In addition, you will be paired up with a mentor and supported by other fellow Governors from a long established Governing Body with many years of combined experience.

Being part of a school Governing Board is very rewarding because they can make a real difference to the children's experiences in school. To do this you will need to be available for:

- at least 2 meetings each term (daytime and evening meetings);
- training sessions relevant to your post (you can choose a daytime or evening session but there will be minimum requirements to meet);
- school monitoring visits (minimum of 2 per year mainly during school hours);
- occasional INSET training sessions with whole school staff (after school); and
- a four year term of office.

Currently, the Governing Body is particularly looking for people who have some knowledge or skills in either buildings, health and safety or legal services. However, please do get in touch if you feel you have skills to offer the school, even if they are different from those mentioned.

COVID UPDATES


There have been a number of queries at school regarding PCR test and LFD tests. The advice for people who have a positive lateral flow device (LFD) test result changed yesterday, some of the changes we were also not aware of. So for clarification, the following information has been taken from the government website today: https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/covid-19-stay-at-home-guidance/stay-at-home-guidance-for-households-with-possible-coronavirus-covid-19-infection.

The advice for people who have a positive lateral flow device (LFD) test result has changed. They are no longer required to have a follow-up polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test, and they should stay at home and self-isolate immediately.

People who have a positive LFD test result should only have a follow-up PCR test if:

- they wish to claim the <u>Test and Trace Support Payment</u>
- they have a health condition that means they may be suitable for new coronavirus (COVID-19) treatments
- they are taking LFD tests as part of research or surveillance programmes, and the programme asks them to do so
- they have a positive day 2 LFD test after arriving in England

You do not need to take a PCR test if you have already taken an LFD test and the result was positive, but please be aware that some companies are still requesting that staff do continue to take a PCR test if someone has symptoms. The Department for Education has stated that children can return to school after testing negative on an LFD test on day 6 and day 7 (tests must be 24 hours apart). To help understand this further, please see the chart below.



If your child tests positive on an LFD test, please send us the receipt you will receive when you enter the details into the website you have to report a positive result to. This is the website: <u>https://www.gov.uk/report-covid19-result</u>

TALK TOGETHER about Perseverance

FAMILY FOCUS

The Perseverance Challenge

Ask each member of the family to write (on identical pieces of paper) a challenge that will require **perseverance** to complete. Fold the paper 4 times and place it in a bag with the others. Invite each person to place their hand into the bag (whilst looking the other way) and pick out a challenge which they have one week to complete. (Think carefully about the challenge you set and if possible make it a worthwhile and useful thing to do).

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HOME-SCHOOL CHALLENGE



Mosaics are one of the oldest ways to make art. People have been arranging tiny coloured pieces of glass or pottery for thousands of years to create beautiful designs. But the process is time consuming and needs lots of **perseverance**. This term's Home-School Challenge is to make a mosaic picture (no bigger than $A_3 - 29x42cm$) using small pieces of coloured paper. The subject of your mosaic is up to you. HALL OF FAME

Prince George

Prince George, later to become King George VI, had always been shy and had developed a stammer, which meant he could not speak for very long without struggling to say the words he wanted to say.

His elder brother, Edward, was very different. He was confident, loved to be the centre of attention and was destined to become King of England.

But soon after the coronation, King Edward announced that he was going to abdicate – to give up being king. His younger brother would now become king in his place. George was horrified! He felt sick with fright. Now he would be expected to deliver speeches and give radio broadcasts to millions! How would he be able to do this with his dreadful stammer? But George knew that it was his duty to serve his country.



He knew that he must overcome his fears and do his very best. He employed an Australian speech therapist to help him and with **perseverance** and great courage George was able to face the challenges ahead. When war was declared in 1939 King George gave a famous speech. He comforted and encouraged his people and won everyone's respect because they knew how brave he was being.

FASCINATING FACTS

Perseverance in the Natural World

Many birds show remarkable **perseverance** as they build their nests, piece by piece often in cold, wet and windy weather and at risk from predators.

The long-tailed tit is just one example. Weighing just 9g, this little bird takes 3 weeks or more to build a nest. The oval shaped nest is made from moss, cobwebs and hair, covered on the outside with lichen and lined with up to 2000 tiny feathers!



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
