RISING COVID CASES

Unfortunately, numbers of children testing positive has been increasing in the last week or so. This is also following the trend nationally, due to all restrictions lifting nationally on 24 February. As a reminder please see the below extract from a previous newsletter should your child test positive.

'Living with COVID-19' outlines a range of significant changes, some of which took taken effect last week. These key changes include the end of legal requirements to isolate for people with a positive test and unvaccinated contacts; the end of routine contact tracing including the end of advice for close contacts to do daily testing; the end of advice for people to do regular twice weekly asymptomatic lateral flow tests, including school staff and pupils in secondary schools (apart from special schools and alternative provision); the end of financial and practical support offers for those required to isolate.

Despite these changes, the current public health advice remains that people with COVID-19 symptoms should isolate and book a PCR test. And anyone who tests positive either via LFT or PCR test, should isolate for 10 days (but can do LFTs on day 5 and 6, and safely return to normal activities on day 6 if both are negative). While this is no longer legally enforceable, it is still advised for all staff and pupils in schools and settings. In most cases, parents and carers will agree that a pupil with the key symptoms of, or who test positive for COVID-19 should not attend the school, given the potential risk to others. If a parent or carer insists on a pupil attending your school where they have a confirmed or suspected case of COVID-19, you can take the decision to refuse the pupil if, in your reasonable judgement, it is necessary to protect other pupils and staff from possible infection with COVID-19. This advice is in line with other infectious diseases and illnesses.

With all of this in mind, we have taken the decision that we would follow the advice for any child to continue to isolate if they tested positive and would not allow them to attend school until they tested negative for two consecutive days (after day 5 of isolation). We hope that parents understand and support us with this decision.'

Warn and inform letters will only be sent out to classes where there are a significant number of cases and we have been asked to do so from the Local Authority.

POLITE REMINDER

Please can we remind parents that we follow DFE advice for sickness and diarrhoea. A child should not attend school until 48 hours after diarrhoea or sickness. If medication is prescribed, the full course must be completed and there is no further diarrhoea or vomiting for 48 hours after the course is completed.

SUCCESS FOR BETH!

We would like to say a massive well done to Bethany Dawson in Year 6 who has taken part in the 15th Chojinkai Children's Open Championships at Penrith Leisure Centre. Lady Justice

Lady **Justice** is one of the most famous landmarks in London. It is a bronze statue that stands on the domed roof of the Old Bailey. This building houses the central criminal courts where people who are accused of breaking the law are tried by a judge and jury to find out if they are 'guilty' and should be punished or 'not guilty' and can go free.

Lady **Justice** was designed to be a symbol of **justice**: in her left hand she carries the scales of truth and fairness and in her right hand a double edged sword representing the power of reason and **justice**.


COMMUNITY NEWS
